What is an Ally?

- Involves way of thinking, more engaged than "friendship."
 - In US models for allies #BLM Black Lives Matter and #NODAPL No Dakota Access Pipeline.
- Learning in IWS:
 - Publicize one another's work
 - Don't directly compete
 - Don't publicize conflicts
 - Talk up Others' Projects/Give of yourself. Be ally.
 - Produce New Archives: Document!





- Recognition that Indigenous people (40 coastal Native nations) historically occupied coastal regions in which surfing takes
 place today
- Indigenous people continue to live their lives in California spaces that are ancestral homelands.
- Surfing in California imported from Indigenous Hawaii

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
- Background: Surf commentators have only recently grappled with the history of mainland Indigenous dispossession. Particular Hawaiian surfers (the great Duke Kahanamoku for instance) have been featured in movies and popular histories, but there is less public consciousness about native histories in California including Indigenous surfing today.
- o Join us: The Institute for Women Surfers (www.instituteforwomensurfers.org) is committed to building alliances. Workshops in contemporary surfing identify the issue of localism or territoriality as a form of settler colonial masculine power a small group believes they "own" local waves and attempt to control who can surf them. Localism defies community values as well as the democratic charge of the California Coastal Act, which envisions access to all.
- Take action: By adding "legislative findings," AB 1782 has a chance to create alliances between surfers and native people and educate the general public about Indigenous history and present-day Indigenous life.



Equity and Coastal Access – Overcoming the Intangible Barriers to California's Coast (Jennifer Savage)

- Despite the guarantee of "maximum access" in the Coastal Act, coast ion the tipping point of being out of reach for many Californians
- Efforts to open physical access ways have been largely successful, but challenges continue re: more diverse and inclusive educational and recreational opportunities for underserved populations \
- Panel participants strive (through culture change orgs) to overcome barriers, amplify voices women of color
- Address intangible barriers with determination used to fight physical access challenges (ie gates, eroding beaches).

- New ways of seeing and doing (art, music, events)
- New communities
- Respect Difference, don't normalize it
- Collaboration and alliance between organizations (in lieu of competition for piece of surf industry pie)
- Place-based, geographically located activisms
- Projects engaged in movement/curriculum,
 not surf charities or beach-for-a-day projects
- Institute's role: hold the space, support, contribute conceptual labor, knowledge belongs to group.
